3. What can I do with a degree in EIL?

Policy analyst in various federal and provincial agencies; analyst for international organizations or NGOs; analyst for multinational corporation; MA in Political Science, International Affairs, International Development or related disciplines; specialized studies in your third language.

4. How is my language competency assessed?

After admission in the program, but before registering your courses, you will need to take an online placement test in French or in English, whatever is your second language.

Yes, these tests serve to assess your level of competency in that language.

Certainly. The exchange program of the University of Ottawa offers a great opportunity to specialize in your third language while taking international relations courses at the same time.
